#### WASHINGTON COUNTY ELECTION COMMISSION 2020 Budget Request

The responsibility of the Election Commission (the "Commission") shall be to coordinate and conduct all elections held in Washington County.

The Commission's budget reflects our required responsibilities for the 2020 Presidential General Election Year, which will be the largest election ever held in Washington County. The budget reflects poll worker pay for the Primary, potential Primary Run-Off, General Election and potential General Election Run-Off. The Commission also anticipates several special Elections based on previous election years.

All poll workers are required to attend training before the Primary Election, as well as refresher training before the General Election. The number of registered voters continues to increase, along with voter turnout. This requires the continued use of a large number of poll workers who are well trained and a significant amount of voting equipment. The budget also includes a \$1.00 per hour raise for poll workers. The last poll worker raise was in 2014. Recruitment and retention of poll workers is key to holding secure and accurate elections.

#### Small Equipment Funding Request

Washington County received partial funding from the Secretary of State's office in 2016, and additional funding from the Quorum Court to purchase new voting equipment. The Commission is asking for an additional \$25,000 to purchase 6 more ExpressVotes in 2020. This number will allow the Commission to provide adequate voting equipment to all vote centers based on the continued increase in population for Washington County.

# Washington County Sheriff's Office Capital Expense Request for 2020 Budget \$106,500 (Vehicles Line Item - 1000 0400 4005) July 31, 2019

The Sheriff's Office Enforcement Division is requesting a total of \$106,500 in capital outlay funds from the vehicle line item for the 2020 budget to purchase the following vehicles:

#### **Replacement Tahoes**

- 2 Chevrolet Tahoes, 2-wheel drive, police package
- 1 Chevrolet Tahoe, Tahoe Special Service Utility vehicle 4-wheel drive

As in the past, we intend to purchase these utilizing the Arkansas State bid pricing. The current bid price for these vehicles is \$34,401 each, but the contract is only good through October 30, 2019. Because of possible price increases in 2020, we have estimated each Tahoe at a cost of \$35,500.

These vehicles will be replacements for high mileage Enforcement units (we have three units over 131,000 miles). When we first began the change over to the Tahoe platform several years ago, we told the Quorum Court we expected to get more mileage from them and that has been the case. In fact, we are only requesting three replacements in 2020 as we are now striving to get around 130,000 miles from the Tahoes before having to replace them or move them to a less demanding role. One of the Tahoes being replaced has already been moved to a less demanding role and may have up to 140,000 miles by the end of 2019.

Of all the Patrol Tahoes, we have two 2012 models, six 2013 models, four 2015 models, seven 2016 models (of which six are 4x4 models), seven 2017 models, fourteen 2018 models and five 2019 models (of which one is a 4x4 model). We have no 2014 Tahoes because that year no capital money was appropriated for vehicles.

It's important to note we have a "hand-me-down" process when we retire a patrol vehicle. Those that are still mechanically reliable will be re-assigned to a less demanding role within our office. This could include assignment to deputies within Court Services, Training, and Civil Process.

Our Patrol vehicles are operated daily on county roads, many of which are still gravel. We must also sometimes drive across fields, creeks, and traverse some pretty treacherous private driveways in our daily duties to answer calls of citizens. The constant vibration of driving, opening and closing of doors to get in and out of the vehicle, extra idling, high speed driving, uncooperative prisoners, etc., all take a toll on the vehicle. The 100,000 miles a civilian may put on their own vehicle does not compare to a vehicle that has been in police service for the same mileage.

## Washington County Sheriff's Office Budget Explanation – 2020 Budget Sheriff's Budget: 1000-0400

July 31, 2019

The following information is supplemental to the submitted budget worksheets for the 2020 budget.

Because the budget we have submitted does not include any potential raises at this point, you will notice we have reduced our budget by over \$ 180,000 from the 2019 Budget which is almost a 2% decrease. This decrease is in spite of our budget absorbing a sergeant's slot from the Jail budget.

This document is further explanation for line items we felt noteworthy because of amounts decreasing or in some cases increasing.

#### Line Item and Description

1001 – Salary Full-Time Amount Requested \$ 5,546,857 Decreased by \$ 150

We examined 117 slots and made sure the proper amount of salary was allocated. Due to some retirements our yearly costs were reduced. Additionally, we have added 1 additional slot and those funds (\$ 55,703) are included in this request. However, this slot is merely moving a position from the Jail Budget to the Enforcement budget, so there will be a like reduction to the Jail Budget. This position is a Sergeant assigned to Training and we felt this Sergeant needed to be in the same budget as our other Training Sergeant, especially since they are supervised by the same Captain. Even with this additional expense, our Salary line item decreased slightly.

2001 – General Supplies Amount requested: \$ 50,900 Decreased by \$ 4,603

Decreased based on buying patterns and projections through 2019.

2002 – Small Equipment Amount requested: \$ 67,500 Decreased by \$ 7,500

We have decreased this line item because we are requesting less vehicles to purchase next year and will need less equipment.

2012 – Bulletproof Vests Amount Requested: \$ 16,000 Decreased by \$ 13,180

We will have fewer vests expiring in 2020 than this year so we project less costs.

3020 – Telephone/Fax Landline Amount Requested: \$ 9,900 Decreased by \$ 1,100 Reduced based on what monthly charges are expected to be.

3021 – Postage Amount Requested: \$ 15,300 Increased by \$ 1,300

The actual cost of postage went up and we are required to mail out Jury Notices for all of the Circuit Judges and the notices have also been increasing in number.

3023 – Internet Connection Amount Requested: \$ 11,115 Increased by \$ 9,115

Our internet line is currently paid for out of the County IT department budget. We have talked with IT Director Sidney Reynolds and he agrees this expense should be moved to our budget. This should be budget neutral since this is General Fund and the County IT budget should be reduced by a like amount.

3053 – Fleet Liability Amount requested: \$ 72,000 Increased by \$ 8,000

The budget for liability insurance for our vehicles has increased and this amount is within 900.00 of what we actually paid in 2019.

3054 – Other Sundry Insurance Amount Requested: \$ 0 Decreased by \$ 37,000

A memorandum from the Comptroller explained a change in how liability insurance costs are allocated has resulted in our costs going to zero and most of the cost being charged to the Jail budget.

Decreased due to requesting only 3 vehicles for 2020. A more detailed explanation detail about this Capital request has been submitted separately.

#### Re: Request for two additional Intake Officer for the 2020 budget

Dear Honorable Quorum Court Members:

I am requesting two additional Juvenile Intake Officers in the 2020 budget. The additional staff request is for the following reasons:

- In 2018, Washington County Juvenile Court Intake officers received over 1,000 delinquency (criminal) citations from area law enforcement; from January 1, to August 14, 2019, we have received 711 delinquency citations;
- In 2018, Washington County Juvenile Court received 319 Family In Need of Services (FINS) affidavits from Washington County area schools for truancy issues or parents for behavior issues; from January 1, to August 14, 2019, we have received 238 FINS affidavits from schools and/or parents;
- 3. Currently Washington County Juvenile Court has two Delinquency Intake Juvenile Officers and one FINS Intake Juvenile Officer. Intake Juvenile Officers meet with the juveniles and their parents, confer with police officers and prosecutors in efforts to divert as many cases as possible from formal prosecution. Juvenile Intake Officers also supervise the juveniles on diversion and supervise juveniles who have pending juvenile delinquency and FINS cases;
- 4. The Restoring Arkansas Families Act takes effect on July 1, 2020, at which time all juvenile court officers across the state are to use validated risk assessments. These risk assessments require several hours of interviews, collection of supporting mental health, educational and social history and an in depth written court report.

Washington County Juvenile Court needs additional Intake Juvenile Officers given the increasing number of delinquency citations, FINS referrals and our growing population. Therefore, I am requesting two Intake Juvenile Officer Positions with a salary of \$33,676.00 per officer for a total of \$67,352.00 in additional salaries for the 2020 budget. As always, thank you for your support.

I am writing to request two additional deputy prosecutor positions in our next budget. I believe based on our population increase and, more importantly, our increased caseload, two additional positions are warranted. For purposes of candor, it appears as if our office will receive an additional prosecutor from this most recent legislative session. As an organization, the Arkansas Prosecuting Attorneys' Association requested eleven new deputy positions, three of which were designated for our office. The legislature approved two of the eleven positions. While nothing has been finalized, I am confident that we will get one of those two positions.

Our office is currently comprised of sixteen deputy prosecutors assigned to handle cases in Washington County. All but one of those are state-funded positions. We currently have twelve deputies handling adult felony cases, two in juvenile court, one doing district court, and one in drug court.

In 2013, our office filed 2,147 new felony cases. At that time, we had one fewer deputy than we have now. Every year since then, we have had double digit growth in our case filings. Last year, our filings reached 4,076 new felony cases. That does not include the probation revocations we handle. Even with the change to the revocation rules in 2015, we filed 1,317 revocation petitions last year. In short, the numbers are not manageable.

As the court well knows, in this last legislative session, the Fourth Judicial District was granted a new judgeship. Recently, the current circuit judges met and decided that this new judge will handle half of all juvenile cases. This includes both types of juvenile cases that our office handles...delinquencies and Family in Need of Services cases. Because of that, along with the increased caseload in juvenile court, I have to put an additional full-time prosecutor in that court. That means that I will not be able to assign the position I anticipate getting from the legislature to adult circuit court.

Currently, our adult felony prosecutors are handling an average caseload of 185 cases. However, that number only represents about half of the actual work that each deputy does. In addition to the nearly 5,400 cases we handled last year, there were hundreds of cases that weren't filed. Each one of those was reviewed by a prosecutor in our office. Before a filing decision can be made, each case must be reviewed by a prosecutor. Those cases come to our office in the form of either a warrant request or a probable cause arrest. In many of those, a prosecutor determines that there is not enough evidence to file a charge, so those are not included in the above numbers. Yet each one takes time to review. Our deputies are also responsible for preparing and electronically filing felony informations. They also spend time meeting with victims, officers, and witnesses (as all lawyers do) in cases that are pending and under review. Additionally, because of the nature of the job they do, our deputies are constantly fielding phone calls from officers. These calls range from officers seeking advice on a search issue or a question about a suspect interrogation, to an officer seeking a felony citation or a bond recommendation.

Those are just a few of the many responsibilities that our deputies have. Additional deputies would be helpful in a number of ways. First and foremost, it would allow our deputies to become more productive. It would obviously mean fewer cases to resolve, fewer discovery requests to fulfill, more time to work on the cases they have. I believe that it would allow us to resolve our cases in a more timely fashion. Deputies would have time to look at their cases sooner, especially those cases with a defendant who is in custody. While I cannot guarantee that this would result in lower numbers there, one major focus will be the continued effort to reduce the overcrowding issue at the county jail.

I am certainly mindful that for nearly twenty years, the salaries of prosecuting attorneys have been the responsibility of the state. That is why I first made my request of the legislature this past spring. However, as I stated earlier, that request was only partially granted. Since new positions typically are not considered during a fiscal legislative session, I do not anticipate another opportunity to ask for positions until 2021. That is why I am asking the county to fund two positions. I am asking that the positions be funded at a rate of \$62,500. This is just under the starting salary for a deputy prosecuting attorney employed by the state.

I have also included in my budget request for next year an additional \$5,000 in parttime funds. This will allow us to hire an additional law clerk. Our law clerks handle a number of tasks within the office, but where they are most helpful is in processing warrant requests. After the appropriate amount of training, our clerks review many of the requests, determine if there is enough information there for a warrant, and then draw up a draft warrant for final review by a prosecutor. As our caseload has gone up, so have the warrant requests. The backlog has gotten to a point that our clerks cannot keep up, so there is a considerable wait-time for warrants. An additional clerk will keep our deputies from having to do this, as well as speed up the process. For a point of reference, we have three law clerks handing work for adult circuit court, which is covered by twelve deputy prosecutors. This is the same number of clerks that we had when I started in 1998. Back then, there were five deputies handling adult circuit court.

As always, I'd be more than happy to answer any questions you might have, either now, or when our budget is being reviewed. Thank you for your consideration.

Dear Honorable Members of the Quorum Court,

For many years, our office has asked for only minimal increases to our budget. We appreciate your work and efforts to cut unnecessary costs. This time, we are once again not asking for any big increases to our operating budget. However, our caseload has grown to the point where we need more attorneys. Other than changing our misdemeanor attorney from a part-time to a full time position, we have had no increase in the number of attorneys who handle our adult felony and juvenile cases since 2000, despite our county's growth. As a result, the average attorney's caseload has doubled in those nearly twenty years. For this reason, we are in desperate need of three additional attorneys for our office. We are asking that you fund three additional attorneys for our office.

Due to our increased caseloads, we sometimes do not even have enough attorneys to send to all the different courts that we have to cover on a given day. This does not just affect our clients; it affects our county's judges, prosecutors, and Sheriff's Department. Moreover, because of our backlog in caseload, our county jail is filled to the brim with defendants awaiting trial, costing the county countless funds from long, drawn out cases. We believe all of the judges we regularly appear in front of will confirm that there is a dire need for more public defenders in our office. We understand that District Attorney Matt Durrett is also requesting new attorney positions from the state and the county to handle the increase in cases due to population growth.

We have tried to seek help from the state to no avail. At each legislative session, the Arkansas Public Defender Commission has requested more attorneys. However, despite demonstrated need, in the last two sessions, the legislature granted the Commission only two additional attorney positions for the entire state, neither of which was assigned to our office.

Since 2000, our office has had fourteen attorneys – one assigned only to the misdemeanor cases in district courts, one for Juvenile Court, one for Drug Court, and ten for the Circuit Court, which includes adult felony cases, mental commitments, and Adult Protective Services cases.

Our single Juvenile Court attorney is *currently* managing 548 juvenile cases. With the added addition of another juvenile court soon to come, this burden is sure to only increase on our single juvenile public defender. We absolutely must hire another attorney to meet this need.

Our Circuit Court attorneys have also reached their breaking point. Our ten Circuit Court attorneys are currently managing 3,620 new felony cases and 350 revocations of felony probation. This number does not included cases that have already been dealt with this year or that we will be assigned as the year continues. Further, this number does not include the mental commitments and Adult Protective Services cases that these Circuit Court public defenders are also solely responsible for handling that often arise on short notice and must be deal with immediately, often pulling our circuit court attorneys away from scheduled work on felony cases.

Of those cases, our circuit court attorneys currently represent four clients charged with Capital Murder and 83 clients charged with Class Y Felonies, some of whom are charged with more than one Class Y Felony. Public defenders assigned to these cases must work on them with particularly extreme detail as state law requires a sentence of 10-40 years or life in prison for Class Y Felonies and potentially death in capital cases if they are found guilty. State law also requires that we appoint at least two attorneys who are certified for capital cases in all capital cases, a significant burden for our only three attorneys who are currently capital-certified.

Our office does not have any control over our caseload and appointments. The district and circuit court judges appoint our office based on the income of the defendant, and as the number of cases filed by the state increases, so do our numbers. Many criminal defendants are homeless,

have mental health and/or substance abuse problems, and/or do not have reliable transportation, preventing them from successfully gaining full-time employment. As a result, public defenders handle an estimated 90%-95% of criminal defendants who use an attorney in Arkansas.<sup>1</sup>

The American Bar Association ("ABA") provides guidelines on the maximum caseloads a public defender can take on without jeopardizing a client's right to an attorney and fair trial. The ABA cites in its guidelines a report stating that each public defender can manage no more than 150 felonies, 400 misdemeanors, 200 juvenile court cases, or 200 mental commitment cases per attorney over an entire year. If an attorney is responsible for multiple types of cases, these numbers are to be adjusted accordingly. For instance, an attorney may handle at maximum 75 felonies and 100 mental commitment cases over the course of a year if she manages a caseload evenly divided between the two types of cases. As you can see from the numbers, our office is grossly out of line with what is recommended by the ABA. As a result, our attorneys, who are all deeply committed to representing their clients, have serious concerns about their ability to uphold their ethical duties to their clients.

The ABA recommends that, when lack of funding results in under-staffing, public defenders should take drastic steps, including refusing to accept appointments, requesting that new appointments be stopped, and requesting to be allowed to withdraw from cases and discontinue representation.<sup>2</sup> We do not want to resort to these extreme alternatives as a solution for our county as the remedy is often to pay private attorneys to step in. We want to provide thorough and efficient services to our clients. However, we cannot continue to do so without help. It is clear no relief is coming from the state. Therefore, the county bears the burden in increased jail costs, court expenses, and potential lawsuits. Hiring more public defenders can help alleviate the strain the county court system and jail is facing.

We have worked very hard to adjust to the ever-increasing workload as our county rapidly grows, but we have reached a breaking point as evidenced by our caseload. We are therefore asking for three new attorney positions. We will assign one to cover the new Juvenile Court and two to help cover adult Circuit Court cases. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to reach out for more information.

Dear Judge Zimmerman and Quorum Court Members:

I have been the court reporter for the Washington County Administrative Court since July 1, 2003. Ray Reynolds was the magistrate judge at that time and until December 31, 2016. Initially we only did arraignments. When the Arkansas legislature passed legislation requiring 8.1 hearings, we then began also doing 8.1 hearings. However, we did not do bond hearings during this time frame.

January 1, 2017 Judge Graham Nations began doing 8.1 hearings and arraignments on Mondays, Judge Casey Jones did said hearings on Wednesdays, and the circuit judges began rotating on Fridays. We also began having bond hearings at arraignments.

January 1, 2018 new legislation required a public defender to be present with detainees for 8.1 hearings. We began having bond hearings at 8.1 hearings. Having legal representation as well as a bond hearing at an earlier date has enabled many detainees to bond out earlier, thus shortening the time frame in which the county was housing these individuals. Detainees who have failed to appear because of incarceration in another facility or hospitalization, and have the proper paperwork verifying such confinement, are now being released at their 8.1 hearing, thus shortening their time in detention. For some time I had felt concern for people being detained longer than necessary when they had a legitimate excuse for not appearing. The bond hearings are something that has been needed at this level for quite some time.

In 2016 the Washington County Prosecutor's Office filed 3,081 cases. In 2018 the Prosecutor's Office filed a little over 4,000 cases. This is a twenty-five percent (25%) increase in 2 years in the number of cases being filed. The increase in case

filings, coupled with the bond hearings, has significantly increased the amount of time we are spending in court.

I am requesting an increase in salary to \$27,300.00. This puts the daily wage for the Administrative Court in line with what the State allows for substitute court reporters. Court reporters who fill in for Circuit Court reporters are paid \$175 per day whether they are there all day or just for one (1) hour. When I am unable to be present for court, I pay another court reporter my daily rate. I have difficulty finding substitutes partially because the pay is not competitive with the Circuit Courts. If this increase were approved, the only reason for a future request for an increase would be if the State increases the daily rate for substitute court reporters, which is done by state statute, and is not likely in the near future.

I am writing to request a personnel increase of 1 FTE for the fiscal year of 2020. I believe that this is necessary to properly live out our departmental mission:

To honor and improve the quality of life for the Veterans, survivors and dependents throughout Washington County by providing exemplary Veteran advocacy, information and access to benefits earned.

This increase establish a program comparable to other Veteran Service Offices of comparable size. Benton and Sebastian counties, our two most comparable counties, both have a three to four person staff. Without this increase we will not be able to reach the strategic goals that were set out in previous strategic planning sessions. This increase will allow us to:

- Meet Future Demand. Our target appointment ratio for veteran per VSO is set at 80. Our current case load as an office is approximately 211 per month with peak periods over 255 per month. We are projected to finish out this year with a growth rate of around 18% and are not going to be able to meet these needs with our current staffing levels for the next year let alone the year after.
- Increase Quality Control Protocol. It is necessary, at any service level we are at and above to begin to institute new quality control measures. The quality of the services we provide directly affect the income of the veterans we serve. Presently the average income of a veteran receiving disability or pension benefit is just under \$20,000 annually. Small errors can have a detrimental effect on this already at risk population and most errors can be solved by quality control measures and a proactive retraining program we currently do not have the staff to support.

Replacing roof top units for the detention center. Units have been running 24/7 since 2003. These units run 2/3 more runtime than a normal office building. Recently the units have been worked even harder due to the overcrowding of the detention center which has introduced more of a heat load that the unit was not designed to handle. The current units are starting to show wear and tear on the compressors and the coils. They are R22 refrigerant costing \$14.16 a pound. The new units are more energy efficient and are 410A refrigerant at \$4.38 a pound. This funding would allow the start process of a rotation enabling the detention center to replace several units each year, spreading the cost of replacement of all the roof top units over a 15- year life expectancy.

The Police Tahoes will replace existing transport vehicles used for detainee transports both in and out of state. Transport vehicles average 40,000 to 45,000 miles per year due to the high demands of the court systems. The vehicles marked for replacement currently have high mileage ranging from 120,000 to 135,000 miles. The Ford Transit van will be added to the fleet and is needed due to the increase in the number of detainees that are being transported. These vehicles are used to transport detainees to and from prisons, courts and a variety of other places that we travel to while overseeing the health of the detainees. The insert that is used in the van is an American Aluminum 3 compartment transport insert. The unit includes a rear and side heavy duty step and a front locking console. This unit includes a swinging "squish" seat in the forward compartment making it a 4 compartment system, if needed. This is used for high risk inmates that are transported to be isolated from other inmates. This insert is the newest technology in prisoner transport cells and creates a safer environment for detainees, officers and the public. Addition of 16 booking/release deputies. 4 corporals and 12 deputies totaling \$808,719.44 This includes salary, boliday incentive, EICA, APER

This includes salary, holiday incentive, FICA, APERS, health and life insurance. Springdale is projecting to arrest 7,500 individuals that will be sent to Washington County. Taking

Springdale's arrest numbers and our projections for the entire year we will intake 22,454, book-in 22,852 and release 22,754 detainees for a total of 68,062 total this year alone.

Our current staff consist of 3 bookers, 2 intake males, and 1 intake female. These same Deputies also have to book and release all detainees. Presently our personnel currently book approximately 15,000 people a year. This only includes detainees being booked into the facility. These same people also are projected to release 15,300 detainees a year.

With our current staffing levels, we are unable to maintain a system that is efficient, timely, safe and secure. These intakes range from intoxicated people to combative individuals that cannot be housed with anyone else. We also have an ever growing population of mental health issues that require repeated checks due to their propensity to hurt themselves. These checks have to be conducted every fifteen minutes. If the detainee is found to be attempting to harm themselves, we have to restrain them which takes multiple deputies.

Booking already has a high volume of bodies traveling through it. Court alone adds over 8,800 bodies between coming and going to court and felony appearances. Also Probation/Parole, Bondsman, Attorney's/ Attorney contact and other agencies request to speak with detainees in the booking area. All of the detainees have to be physically searched and tracked back to housing.

Having sixteen more positions will allow each shift 4 more deputies. This allows us to utilize all 5 booking stations and will give us 3 male intakes (*initial search, shower out, print individuals, court, bondsman, attorney, attorney contact, dress out to leave*) 2 female intake (*initial search, shower out, print individuals, court, bondsman, attorney, attorney, attorney, attorney, attorney contact, dress out to leave*) to compensate for the overwhelming flow of bodies through booking.
