

Gulf Coast HIDTA Program Summary 2020

Our Mission

The mission of the Gulf Coast HIDTA is to reduce illicit drug availability and its harmful consequences within its designated areas by supporting intelligencedriven task forces and supporting infrastructure designed to target, disrupt and eliminate drug trafficking organizations impacting our region and beyond.

- The 35 enforcement initiatives of the Gulf Coast HIDTA investigated 1,263 drug trafficking organizations (DTOs) and money laundering organizations (MLOs) and were successful in disrupting or dismantling 488 of these organizations. Forty-five percent of the disrupted or dismantled organizations were part of an international or multi-state drug trafficking or money laundering organization.
- More than 1,152 federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement agents, officers, analysts, and support personnel took part in the 35 Gulf Coast HIDTA initiatives. Seventy one percent of the participants were from state, local or tribal agencies.
- In 2020, Gulf Coast HIDTA initiatives seized 11,901 kilograms of marijuana, 9,124 kilograms of powder and crack cocaine, 2,465 kilograms of methamphetamine powder and crystal methamphetamine, 179 kilograms of heroin, 38 kilograms of fentanyl powder, and 1,163 kilograms of prescription narcotics. Gulf Coast HIDTA initiatives also seized more than 1,525 dosage units of methamphetamine powder and crystal methamphetamine, 75 dosage units of heroin, 2,999 dosage units of marijuana, 96,592 dosage units of prescription narcotics, 8,586 dosage units of fentanyl, 189 liters of methamphetamine, and 1,190 liters of other prescription drugs.
- The wholesale value of these and other illicit drugs seized by Gulf Coast HIDTA in 2020 was \$388,087,000.
- In 2020, Gulf Coast HIDTA also seized over \$48 million in cash and other assets valued at over \$4.9 million.
- The combined value of the illegal drugs seized and the cash and assets taken from traffickers equates to a return on investment (ROI) of \$48.21 for every Gulf Coast HIDTA dollar budgeted in 2020.
- In 2020, Gulf Coast HIDTA initiatives dismantled one methamphetamine lab.
- Gulf Coast HIDTA deconfliction systems performed more than 2,972 event deconflictions and 9,023 target deconflictions, actions that can alert agencies when their tactical operations are occurring in the same general location and timeframe as operations by other agencies. In 2020, 188 law enforcement agencies participated in the HIDTA event/target deconfliction systems.
- In 2020, Gulf Coast HIDTA supported training for 990 officers, agents, analysts, and support staff on drug related subjects. Follow-up surveys of those attending the Gulf Coast HIDTA training have routinely been 99% positive.
- Gulf Coast HIDTA analysts provided analytical support to 478 investigations in 2020, and 99% of agents and officers surveyed reported the assistance useful.
- In 2020, Gulf Coast HIDTA has made 8,405 arrests, took 2,280 firearms off the street, and apprehended 509 fugitives.
- Gulf Coast HIDTA was responsible for investigating 105 OCDETF cases in 2020.
